Southampton November Court 1832.

Elizabeth Matilda Kello widow of Richard B Kello dec. and William Kello. Richard Kello, James Kello, Samuel Kello and Charles Kello children of the said Richard B Kello, the four last of whom are infants, by Eliza Matilda Kello their Guardian and next friend. Plaintiff
against

John Boyton and Cordine his wife late Cordine Kello. and the said John Boyton as executor of Richard B Kello dec. Defts

This day this cause came on to be heard on the bill and answer and was argued by Counsel. On consideration whereof the Court doth adjudge, order and decree that Richard A Urquhart, George G Gray, and Benjamin Griffin or any two of them do assign to the plaintiff Elizabeth Matilda Kello one third part of the slaves belonging to the Estate of Richard B Kello dec. as and for her dower in the same to be held by her for life; that they do divide the remaining two thirds into six equal parts, and assign one part to ^{each of} the plaintiffs William, Richard, James, Samuel and Charles Kello and one to the defendant John Boyton. And that they report their proceedings in the premises in order to a final decree -

In Conformity to the Annexed decree, we the undersigned Commissioners
have proceeded to divide the slaves belonging to the estate of Richard
B. Kello. dec. in the following manner (viz) we consider it is
worth \$50. to support Rob. for life, and have valued Sam at \$50.
which will ^{make} them worth nothing in valuation, - Henry valued
at \$350, Limon at \$400, Dauy at \$425, Abalom at \$400, Abdisa-
son at \$425, Everett, at \$425, Jerry at \$400, Reuben at \$400,
Oscar at \$200 (considered infirm). Henry \$250, Isaac \$250, Alley
and child Jacob at \$250. Evaline at \$250. Chany \$200, Talley \$150,
Amanda \$125. Army & 2 children, Penelope & Limon, at \$250, Nancy \$150,
Fanny and Child Joe, \$275 Priscilla \$125, Alvine \$75. and Nicholas
\$50. making the sum of \$5825. Taking off one third, say \$1925
for the widow for and during her natural life, and in order to make
that sum, we have allotted to her, Rob. & Sam at victuals & clothes,
Limon. Dauy, Isaac, Alley, Child Jacob, Evaline, Chany, and Nancy
as and for her dower; - leaving the sum of \$3900. to be divided into
six equal parts - which is done in the following manner. Lot N^o 1.
1- Henry at \$350. Fanny & Joe at \$275. making \$625 which is one sixth
part ^{making \$25. which is to be paid by lot N^o 4} and drawn by Charles Kello. - Lot N^o 2. - Contains Abalom
at \$400, Amanda at \$125. & Priscilla at \$125. making \$650, and drawn
by William Kello - Lot N^o 3 - Abdisa at \$425. Talley \$150 Alvine
at \$75. making \$650. and drawn by Samuel Kello. - Lot N^o 4.
Everett \$425. Henry \$250. making \$675. which is \$25. over his pro-
portion, and is to pay over to lot N^o 1. - and drawn by Richard Kello.
Lot N^o 5 - Jerry \$400, Nicholas \$50. and Oscar \$200. making \$650. -
and drawn by John Raykin in right of his wife Caroline -
Lot N^o 6 - Reuben at \$400. Army, Penelope & Limon \$250. making
\$650 - and drawn by James Kello. as ~~and for~~ ^{his} part in said
slaves; - which is respectfully submitted to the Court. - Given
under our hands this 24th day of November 1832
