DRAKE of ISLE of WIGHT and NORTH CAROLINA

The celebrated Sir Francis Drake did not have any sons, but he had several nephews, and it may be that this family descended from one of these nephews (D N B).

The first of the name in Isle of Wight was James Drake, who was a headright of Robert Eley who patented 600 acres in Isle of Wight Sept. 17, 1639, for the transportation of 11 persons. (17C. p. 517) (C.P. 114)

James Drake witnessed a deed in Isle of Wight in 1644. (17C. p. 517) Nothing further is known of him as he probably moved

to Nancemond, where the records were destroyed.

John Drake first appears in the records on April 10, 1703, when he begged pardon in court from William West. (17C. 649) He may have been the son or a relation of a John Drake "late of the County; deed."" who patented 100 acres and deserted it and a patent was granted to William Fowler, 21 Oct. 1690. (Id. 646) This patent for 100 acres had been taken out by Drake in 1682 (P.B. 7-182).

Samuel Browne, in his will made in 1739, gave a legacy to daughter Mary, wife of John Drake, and to his grandsons Jesse

Drake and Samuel Nicholas Drake. (C-2, 98)

John Drake in 1739 witnessed the will of John Vasser. In 1722 Thomas Drake, John Drake, Nicholas Williams, John Drake, Jr. and Richard Drake signed a petition. (Calender of State Papers, Colonial, Vol. 1, p. 204) On May 28, 1733, Thomas Drake, Jr., witnessed the will of John Johnson. (C-2-65).

Miry Boddie, third wife of William Boddie, in her will made in 1727 gave her son-in-law, Thomas Drake, her whole estate. Her first husband was Owen Griffin, second Robert Edwards, third, William Boddie. Thomas Drake had married her daughter, Ann Griffin, daughter of Owen. Thomas Drake made his will in Southampton, Oct. 3, 1758. He mentions wife, Anne, sons JOHN, THOMAS, WILLIAM, and LAZARUS; daughter MARY, wife of William Williams; wits.: Benj. Williams, Jacob Williams, Albritten Drake. (C. p. 25.)

John Drake made his will in Soutnampton, Mar. 15, 1753, mentions eldest daughter MARY; daughters ANN and CATHER-INE PULLY: sons: JOSHUA, THOMAS, BARNABY and TIMO-

THY. (C.p.12)

¹ John and Thomas Drake, above mentioned, and Richard Drake are said to have been brothers. Richard Drake and Thomas Drake patented land in Isle of Wight in 1713. The land of the Drakes fell in Southampton when it was cut off from Isle of Wight in 1748.

Richard Drake made his will in Southampton County Feb. 28, 1759, probated Miy 13, 1759. (C. p.29) He and his wife Margaret had a large family of seven sons and four daughters.

The sons were: FRANCIS, MATTHEW, NATHANIEL, TRISTRAM, WILLIAM, BRITTEN, RICHARD, JR., and EDMOND; daughters: ELIZABETH, MARTHA, who married Jacob Williams (See later).

Jacob Williams was born about 1711 and resided in Southampton County, Va. He married about 1735 MARTHA DRAKE, daughter of MARGARET and RICHARD DRAKE. Children born to his union in Southampton Co., Va.: JOHN, b. 1736, m. Mrs. FRANCES SLATTER (nee Bustin) of Halifax Co. in 1767, and was a major in the Revolutionary War. (Revolutionary Army Accounts, Vol. 12, Sect, of State of N.C.) His will was made 11 Sept. 1794, probated 1795.

John Drake who seems to have been the father of James Drake of Bertie Co., N.C. married Jemima, sister of Thomas Parnell of Isle of Wight. In his will, probated June 9, 1688, Thomas Parnell mentions his sister, Jemima Drake, and gives JOHN DRAKE "my coat of Camel hair." They probably moved to Nansemond, where the records are destroyed. He is said to have died before 1690. (ante)

A John Drake, probably his son, made his will in Bertie, Jan. 5, 1728, same probated May Court, 1729. He gave son JAMES DRAKE "my Manor Plantation; mentions wife Sarah; and appoints JAMES BRYANT his "father-in-law"" executor. (Grimes 102) The designation "father-in-law"" in those days could be interpreted two ways, that either he had married Bryant's daughter or Bryant had married his mother.

What creates a genealogical puzzle that is difficult to analyze is that William Bridgers of Bertie made his will March 11, 1728-29, same probated Nov. 1729. He mentions several children, calls Benjamin Bridgers and WILLIAM BRYANT, brothers and names JOHN DEW "his father" executor. His wife was SARAH who later re-married, made her will as SARAH COTTEN, naming the same Bridgers children mentioned in her first husband's will apd her additional Cotton children (Grimes 47-84). It seems that William Bridger's wife SARAH was a daughter of JOHN DEW and his wife, said to be Susannah Shearer. "Brother" Wil-

liam Bryant is said to have married Patience Dew, sister of William's wife Sarah. This would make them "brothers-in-law."

However, JAMES BRYANT in his will probated March 11, 1731, names his sons: WILLIAM BRYANT, JOHN DEW, RICHARD BRASWELL, JAMES BRYANT, THOMAS BRYANT and Matthew Telar. Exrs.: JOHN DEW and JAMES BRYANT; wit., AARON DRAKE.

WILLIAM BRYANT is said to have married Patience Dew, sister of Sarah, wife of William Bridgers who called "William" Bryant" his brother. James Bryant's wife, not named in his will was "Sarah". On June 23, 1715, they assigned a patent to William Braswell. She gave JOHN DEW a power of attorney to relinquish her dower rights. (Hathaway 28) Why did James Bryant call John Dew a "Son" which would seem that Bryant had married John Dew's mother; and here a John Dew is given a power of attorney by James Bryant's wife, which often indicates a relationship. Now John Drake had a wife named Sarah, also he called James Bryant his "father-in-law". Did John Drake marry a daughter of James Bryant or a daughter of James Bryant's wife? In Wheeler's History of North Carolina, page 275, Wheeler states that James Drake and Benjamin Bridgers were "half-brothers". This can only mean that John Drake's wife Sarah re-married Benjamin Bridger's father, Benjamin, who had a wife named "Sarah" before 1740 when they made a deed.

JAMES DRAKE by Martha Drake Avent

James Drake of Wheeler's History fame was born in 1726, died about 1791. He married twice, first to Sophia Valentine, by whom there were nine children, three sons: ALBRITTON, JAMES, SILAS; and five daughters. His second marriage was to Mrs. Hartwell Hodges Davis, daughter of Benjamin Hodges and his wife Constance Goodrich (for her ancestry see S.V.F. -1-218) of Isle of Wight, later Southampton. She was the widow of Thomas Davis of Isle of Wight. By this marriage there were two sons: JOHN HODGES DRAKE (See later), and BENJAMIN DRAKE.

Wheeler in his History says: "During the Revolution, about 1778, Captain Beard attacked the house of JAMES DRAKE, Esq. of Nash County, N.C. with a band of Tories. There was no one in the house but Mr. Drake, his son ALBRITTON then about seventeen years of age, and Benjamin Bridgers his half brother, Nathaniel Nichols, Henry Massenger and Robert Pilland.

"Albritton, who was one of a corps of light horse and had been on active duty, scouring the country for these very men, ran out and fired. The Tories then surrounded the house and ordered a surrender. Old Mr. Drake seized a gun and advanced on the foe. The Tories, headed by Beard, sword in hand, rushed into the house; Beard was met by young Albritton Drake with a cutlass, but at the first blow, young Drake's cutlass struck the joist above his head and broke off at the hilt. Thp old man then

joined in the melee, with his gun clubbed, but was soon cut down by the sword of Beard, and was so seriously wounded that he was a gore of blood.

"Seeing her husband cut down, old Mrs. Drake rushed in, not with a weapon, but a "jug of old Nash" even to this day celebrated for its excellent flavor. Her entreaties, and the more potent Influence of the liquor produced a parley. She-plied'them so liberally with the brandy that peace was restored. Beard had been an aspirant for the hand of her daughter.

During this time Captain Peter Goodwin with a troop of horse galloped up. Albritton Drake threw up his hat and gave a loud Halloo; Goodwin made a furious attack and Beard and his men made a precipitate retreat. He was encountered by Bridgers, who was near; Bridgers gun missed fire, and Beard used his sword, but was knocked down by Bridgers, who thought he had killed Beard, and went to the house and informed them that he had killed Beard. They all went out to see his dead body, but Beard had recovered so as to sit up. He was then taken into custody.

A Negro man, Simon, who had a wife at Drake's, caught another one of the band named Porch. There were taken to Col. Seawell in Franklin County. They were there tried by Court Martial and both forthwith hung. Such was the end of Captain Beard.

Mr. Drake died in 1790 in the 65 year of his age.

His brave son Albritton, married and then settled in Robeson County, N.C. where his son John lived; then moved to Kentucky. He raised a large family. (See later) His son Col. JAMES P. DRAKE, commanded an Indiana Regiment in the war with Mexico. He died at 80 years of age.

Dr. John Hodges Drake, son of James Drake, was born July 29,1767, in Nash County, N.C., died in Auburn, Ala., Dec. 11, 1859; married about 1835, Miss Frances Williams, daughter of Major John Williams of the Revolution who married Mrs. Bustin of Halifax Co., N.C. May 1794. She was born in 1776 in Halifax Co., and died Feb. 1840. (Revolutionary Army Accts., Vol. 12, Sec. of State of N.C.) Their children were:

They had one daughter, Rosa Bell, born Aug. 28, 1865, in Lawrence Co., Miss., and died Feb. 11, 1936 and is buried in the Calvary Baptist Church Cemetary at Silver Creek, Miss. (See Later)

Rosa Bell Smith first married Thomas Jefferson Bankston, who is buried on the plantation near White Sand, Jefferson Davis County, Miss. They had two children, Grover Cleveland and Varina Estelle Bankston. Rosa Bell Smith Bankston, in 1890, married secondly, Joseph George. They lived for many years at White Sand but later moved to Silver Creek, Mississippi.

He was born 1755 in Nash Co., N.C.; died Nov. 14, 1835, Muhlenberg Co., Ky.; married April 10, 1785, Nash Co., N.C., Ruth Collins, born Nov. 12, 1765, Nash Co., N.C.; died March 4, 1847, Muhlenberg Co., Ky., daughter of Michael Collins. He was a planter and a member of the Methodist Church.

John Drake, born in Robeson Co., N.C., May 26, 1786; died April 28, 1863, was his only son. John Drake married first Feb. 18, 1806, Elizabeth Alford, born Nov. 15, 1789, died

Sept, 9, 1823. His second wife was Margaret McLauchlan by whom he had one daughter, Elizabeth Margaret, bom May 6, 1828.

Elizabeth Alford was a daughter of Clarkey (McTyer) and Sion Alford who is said to have been a Soldier of the Revolution. Sion Alford was the son of Jacob Alford who was bom in New Kent County, Va., Dec. 12, 1738, the son of Susannah and Lodwick Alford. (Parish Register and Vestry Book) Jacob died in Robeson County in 1794. leaving his property by will to his second wife, Mary, and children, Warren, Elias, SION, James, Mary, Wiley and Charity.
